The Lancashire Wildlife Trust LTD	Live Well Green Hub	The Live Well Green Hub will transform the green space at the Whitefield Live Well Centre into a welcoming, volunteer led environment that supports wellbeing, social connection and nature recovery. Through bi-weekly, inclusive gardening sessions, local people will grow food, develop new skills and build meaningful relationships while improving biodiversity. Volunteers will be supported to take ownership of the space, enabling Lancashire Wildlife Trust to step back into a mentoring role and ensure long term sustainability. The project will encourage people to connect with other local green spaces and groups, providing lasting benefits for individuals, the wider community and nature.	£1,909.00
Eden Gardens Allotment Association	Renewal of Insecure Southern Boundary Fencing and Provision of Equipment Storage	It is proposed to replace two particularly ineffective lengths of fencing with 1.8m high V-mesh fencing to secure the boundary and to make the perimeter area of the allotment more aesthetically acceptable. It is also proposed to provide a storage facility for new equipment which will be used to maintain our recently restored Orchard area which will be re-opened to visitors.	£1,138.20

Whitefield Bowling Club CIC	Allotment Refurbishment and Additional Spaces	We have provided eight free allotment spaces to the community for over 30 years. Due to high demand, including a 66-person waiting list at nearby Nipper Lane Allotments, Bury MBC responsible officer asked us to increase provision and forwarded a 22-name list of applicants. We are expanding by eight additional plots, with two already allocated and four taken up by Besses Ward residents (from the list); a further two will be allocated after refurbishment. The plots require investment in topsoil and fertiliser as predominantly sand and previously compost heap for grass cuttings and leaves. We want to procure and offer shared tools on top of our existing equipment. Our groundskeeper will support the project, and we aim to add basic toilet and washing facilities. The project will encourage shared planting and seed exchange, with surplus produce distributed to local community facilities and visitors. We see this as an ideal community project that will encourage the growing of food and hopefully the knowledge and experience will grow into wider neighbourhood home initiative's.	£2,500.00
Whitefield Horticultural Society	Flower Planters	We have permission from the management committee of Whitefield Methodist Church that we can install and maintain three large planters at the front of the Church facing onto Elms street.	£1,025.00

Abingdon Close	Abingdon Green Community Garden	Our project will create an inclusive, wheelchair accessible community garden in our cul de sac, offering a shared space for residents of all ages to grow food, learn, and connect. Alongside fruit, vegetables, and herbs, the site will feature a dementia friendly sensory garden designed to be calming and engaging. We will involve the wider neighbourhood, local primary schools, and scout groups to strengthen community bonds and promote a safer, more connected area. As the second “Right to Grow” initiative in Bury, our growing Abingdon Close group is committed to transforming unused space into a vibrant community asset.	£1,970.00
Besses Together	Growing Besses	Besses Together have been successful in an approved Right to Grow project on Thatch Leach Lane Park. We plan this to be a community growing project from across the Besses area and have already collected over 15 people’s names and contact details who would like to be involved. We believe more people would come forward once the project gets more promotion and people can see the work begin.
